

HOW IT ALL BEGAN... 35 YEARS AGO IN 1962

In 1962, the annual membership fee for AQHA was \$5.00. The Quarter Horse Journal subscription rate was \$4.00 for the year with over 30,000 subscribers. Jack Timmons was the AQHA state director for Connecticut, Maine, Vermont, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, New York and New Hampshire. There already had been fourteen approved Quarter Horse shows within the state in 1961, most with less than 150 horses entered.

There already was a Western New York Quarter Horse Club, Inc. with Jack Timmons as president. This club organized approved Quarter Horse shows to promote Quarter Horses. In January 1962, a small group of Quarter Horse people got together and composed a letter that was mailed out to other Quarter Horse enthusiasts. This letter was an "invite" to attend a meeting in Fairport to discuss the possibility of forming an association to better promote Quarter Horses in New York State.

March, 1962 - information taken from Volume One, NEW YORK STATE QUARTER NEWS.

Nearly 150 Quarter Horse owners, breeders, and raisers from every part of the state gathered at the Green Lantern Inn, Fairport, NY, Sunday, January 21, 1962 for the purpose of banding together to form an organization—with the mutual purpose of better promoting their Quarter Horses.

Open discussion regarding the tentative organization kicked off the meeting with plenty of comment and enthusiasm regarding the promotion of more shows within the state for home-state Quarter Horses. It was decided too, that at the closing of each year for the organization, that being March of every year... a banquet would be held, which time the owner of the horse receiving the most points for the year (IN NEW YORK STATE SHOWS ONLY) would receive a trophy.

Climaxing the meeting was the unanimous agreement of the group to elect officers immediately. Voting resulted in Jack Timmons being nominated and elected President, with Bernard Hoban Jr. - Vice President; Joan Tolhurst - Secretary; John North - Treasurer; and News Correspondent -Bonnie Pritchard. Directors chosen: William Wilkes, Herm Scheer, Conrad Loeber, Leon Losey, James Morgan, Mike Bokman, Howard Bassett, Wayne Schneckenberger, and Hobert Hutchinson.

Adjournment of the meeting followed with everyone relaxing, talking "old shows" and general horse news while they enjoyed a robust dinner served by the management of the Green Lantern Inn.

By June, the above organization's members voted unanimously to change its name to EMPIRE STATE QUARTER HORSE ASSOCIATION in order to avoid conflicting with any other Quarter Horse association or club in New York State. Club membership in ESQHA was \$5.00 for family membership and \$3.00 for an individual. President Jack Timmons summed it up this way, "To promote Quarter Horses to the best of our ability in exhibit, sale, etc., whether it be as

a working horse for the cattleman, a competing horse in roping or cutting contests, a show horse in halter classes, a racer in short distance, barrel races, or just plain pleasure horse... the Empire State QH Association is dedicated to making them untouched in performance, outstanding in recognition, and to promote their growth in the Empire State."

In the July 1962 newsletter, a point system was established and published for all ESQHA members for approved Quarter Horse shows within the state. A call was put out to the general membership to help support and organize "cutting" at the New York State Exposition (Fair) and several members donated money, time, and effort to make this event happen. The initial plans for the Empire State Quarter Horse Ass'n Inc. Approved Ouarter Horse Show were announced for September 29 and 30, 1962 in Trumansburg, NY. Leon and Mary Losey served as the horse show managers. The two day show was held at a small outdoor show arena operated by the Tompkins County Horsemen's Association on the Searsburg Road in Trumansburg (between Ithaca and Watkins Glen). The judge was Dale Whittler and classes started at 3 p.m. on Saturday with both open and AOHA classes, including open cutting and 1/8 mile sprint races. Total horse entries were 115. Not bad for a first time horse show!

1963

The 2nd Annual Horse Show was moved to the New York State Fairgrounds, Syracuse, NY and held September 28-29 1963. ESQHA established a Yearling Halter Futurity to be held, with Howard Bassett as chairman. To cover show expenses, members were asked to sponsor classes for \$5 each to pay for ribbons and to buy advertising in the program at \$20 per page. A Quarter Horse Consignment Sale was held on Saturday night during the show.

The show was a huge success with 177 halter entries, 8 group entries, and 107 performance entries - total of 228 entries. The consignment sale, run by Gordon Hannagan, had 65 horses with the highest sale horse bringing \$9500. One area of disappointment was the number of sprint race horses entered—down from what they needed to cover expenses. The profit for the 1963 show was approximately \$500.00

1964

The ESQHA dues were raised to \$10 and the eligibility for year end awards was changed in that a horse must receive points in at least three ESQHA approved shows to receive an award. Membership had grown to 175 members. The election of officers were held in March and the new president was James Morgan from Skaneateles. There were 26 ESQHA approved Quarter Horse shows for that year.

The 3rd Annual Horse Show was an "A" show, but the weather was real bad. It was quite cold, it snowed and the spectator crowd was down. Admission tickets were sold at the door for

Howard Bassett broke his left ankle in the roping when his mare, CHEYENNE TRINKET, slipped and all four feet went out from under her. Howard proceeded to get right back on, left the ring, and get his daughter, Valerie, ready for her next class on TRINKET. He then went into the show office, sat down, and immediately passed out. Natalie Chapman then took him to the hospital and got his leg cast. High Point horse for the show was LILO's COWGIRL, owned by Florence Grau of New Jersey and won a cooler donated by Mr. and Mrs. Maynard Hund. BUCK'N'BUM's donated eleven trophies for the show.

The total income for the show was \$4,338 and the expenses were \$4,293—a grand profit of \$44.00. Due to the increased rental rates by the NYS Fair, questions were raised whether the club could continue having their annual show at the

fairgrounds in the future.

1966

The Fifth Annual Horse Show was October 8-9 at the NYS Fairgrounds. The weather was perfect and the judge was Dr. Donald Wade. Stalls cost \$7.50. Entry information from the show: Halter—181, Performance—179, Youth Activity—244, Owner-Rider Pleasure—58, Open—352, for a total of 1015 entries.

An added attraction was a Queen Contest which Leon Losey dreamed up the Thursday before the show. It was open to all girls riding in the show and there were 31 entries. They were judged on neatness, appearance, and horsemanship by judges Dr. Don Wade, Professor Willman, Shirley Neale, and Georgiana DeRoller. The winner was Miss Carolyn Edsall from Horseheads who was presented with a rhinestone crown and a bouquet of red roses. The futurities are growing—three yearling colts showed and nine yearling fillies—1st place paid \$132.40. The show cleared \$665.00 this year with the greatest expense being

the rental at the NYS Fair—\$983.00. Everyone still agrees the coliseum is the best place to have this show.

1967

The Sixth Annual Horse Show in Syracuse was held later than usual—October 20-22. The coliseum was supposed to be heated, but the system broke down and it was quite cold. Forty-six weanlings were nominated for the first time Futurities for both Weanling Fillies and Colts. The show had a total of 1297 entries with 60 showing in the futurities.

The Queen Contest was held with 18 entries and the winner was Nancy Swarm from Waverly, PA.


The horse show cleared almost \$1,000 for the club. This show was the largest QH show ever held in NYS to date and fourteenth in the nation.

1968

The Empire State Youth Activity Quarter Horse Association was formed in 1968 with 16 initial members. The first elected president was John Braymiller, vice-president - David Petrie, secretary - Sally Fries, and treasurer - Sandy McFarland. Dues were \$1.50 per year.

The ESQHA Seventh Annual Horse Show was held October 11-13 in Syracuse at the NYS Fairgrounds. There were 526 horses with 1415 total entries. The Junior Western Pleasure had over 100 entries and the ESQHA Futurities had 90 entries. The two year Western Pleasure Futurity winner took home \$386.00. A new class added this year was AQHA English Pleasure. The horse show program had expanded to 44 pages with many picture ads. All Around Youth Activity Champion was Linda Kalina who also won the Owner-Rider Pleasure class sponsored by Harmony Riders Club. The winner of the Queen Contest was Sally Fries of Williamsville, NY.

The second All American Quarter Horse Congress was held in Columbus, Ohio in November. ESQHA was represented by the Youth Activity Team of: David Petrie, Sally Fries, Marsha Weed, Sharyll Zonneville, Russell Morgan, John Braymiller, Donald Daigler, and Linda Kalina. Linda Kalina represented ESQHA in the Queen Competition. She also placed third in the Youth Activity Team Pleasure. The team all wore blue jackets with the ESQHA logo on the breast pocket.

1969

The first ESOHA 1968 Yearbook, a full size 44-page booklet, was put together by Julie Hodgins and Jan Lasal and sold for \$2.00. The NYS Fair built a covered arena off the coliseum and this helped with the overflow of horses at shows. There were six weekends of QH racing at the NYS Fairgrounds track with over \$6,000 awarded in purses.

The ESOHA Eighth Annual Horse Show was held October 10-12 at the NYS Fairgrounds. A total of 516 horses showed with 1463 entries YA English Pleasure was added this year. The show paid out over \$2,700 for the Futurities. Jane Lamb from Baldwinsville won the Queen Contest.

The show profited about \$3,600 - the best we had ever done. The show was in the Top Ten AQHA Shows in the nation: 7th in total entries, 6th in Performance, and 10th in Halter.

1970

There was a ten-day QH race meet at the NYS Fairgrounds in September with nearly onehundred races offered and over 180 horses running. The ads for the program book for the Fall show increased to \$25.00 for a full page.

The ESOHA Ninth Annual Horse Show was held October 9-11 at the NYS Fairgrounds in Syracuse. The weather was quite rainy but they

still had a great show with 1295 total entries. New classes this year were Jr. and Sr. English Pleasure Lorna Schneckenberger and Working Hunter. won the Queen contest out of 17 entries. A big highlight of the show was a new class that was added just for fun - a western pleasure for riders 35 years and older who hadn't shown in a few years. It was winner take all with the winner having to give a party later on for all the other exhibitors. Natalie Chapman won over 17 others and they all had a blast, even had grooms!


The show ranked 11th in the nation in Halter entries, 5th in Performance, 7th in Youth

Activity and 6th overall.

1971

Show entries were down at many QH shows throughout the year in NYS. ESQHA had 42 approved shows: 8 - A, 17 - B, 16 - C and 1 -D. The Tenth Annual ESOHA Horse Show was held October 8-10 at the NYS Fairgrounds in Syracuse. Total show entries were 1405 with 78 futurity entries and 607 AQHA entries. The Queen contest was won by Melanie Smith of Wyoming, NY.
